



CCF cadets planted a memorial garden near the Armoury to remember the thousands of soldiers killed in the Wars.






Fauré's Regiuem and Cantique de Jean Racine as well as Ralph Vaughan Williams' Five Mystical Songs were performed by the Choral Society.

Bromsgrove School continued the partnership with the Bromsgrove International Young Musicians' Competition (BIYMC), holding their four-day music competition in Routh Hall







> Hazeldene, the frst of the girls' day Houses to undergo refurbishment over the summer of 2015, re-opened and was ready for business at the start of term in September.




Philip Mennie (1999-2005) visited Bromsgrove during the summer term with his wife and daughter to look around the School




Over 85 Old Bromsgrovians returned to the School on Saturday, 12th September for a special gathering.



Cookes Ho se Re nion


Old Bromsgrovians returned to School in November 2015 to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the founding of Cookes House.


Cookes House, led by Mr and Mrs Schilzzi, was only in being for 8 years, when in 1972 the House split into Lyttelton and Walters.
